USD Cochlear Implant Mapping Clinic

SDSD Outreach Consultants Nina Ringstmeyer and Kerry Ruth played a crucial role at the USD Speech and Hearing Outreach Clinic in Rapid City on October 26th and 27th. Families residing in the western region were given the opportunity to access cochlear implant and osseointegrated device services closer to home. Partnerships with Rapid City Area Schools (RCAS) and the USD Scottish Rite Speech and Hearing Clinic enabled evaluations at the RCAS Jefferson Building, and special thanks go to Julie Hintgen and Dr. Lisa Hafer for providing the clinic's location. Dr. Messersmith and Liz DeVelder, along with their students, provided audiology and speech services to 14 children, including cochlear implant programming, osseointegrated device programming, consultations, communication support, and language evaluations. Graduate students from the University of South Dakota and Cochlear Americas' Dr. Stephanie Gutzmer, along with SDSD Outreach Consultants Sarah Lingle and Denika Boomsma, contributed to the success of the clinic, which will return in the Spring of 2024.

Witnessing language development is her favorite aspect in this field, "Seeing those wheels turn and recognizing when the little light bulb goes off after a connection is made that turns language into meaningful communication is so rewarding."

October - National Audiology Awareness Month

October is National Audiology Awareness Month and SDSD and the American Academy of Audiology are reminding the public to be aware of the importance of healthy hearing habits. One of the factors in maintaining healthy hearing is being conscious of loud noise exposure. The degree or decibel (dB) level of the noise and the length of time exposed to the noise are key factors in protecting yourself from possible permanent damage.

The American Academy of Audiology states that lengthy or repeated exposure to noise above 85 decibels, can damage hearing. To put that into perspective, noise from fireworks can reach up to 155 decibels. A jet plane taking off is estimated to be 150 decibels. Shooting a gun is around 140-175 decibels (depending on the gun). An amplified music concert and personal music devices with the volume turned all the way up can be as high (or higher) as 120 decibels. Movie action scenes in the theater have been known to reach 100 decibels. Outdoor sounds can pose a risk too. Lawn mowers are around 85 decibels and chain saws can be 115-120 decibels. Compare these with normal conversation that is around 60-65 decibels.

"Healthy hearing habits are important. So much of our day-to-day communication is auditory based, particularly in the educational environment," says SDSD Audiologist, Carly Johnson. Hearing damage due to noise is largely preventable." Part of an audiologist's job is to educate about safe versus unsafe levels for listening. We want to empower you to protect your hearing now, as damage is not reversible.

"Anyone suspecting that his or her hearing has diminished or is unsure, should see an audiologist to discuss their concerns and obtain a baseline assessment," Johnson says. "This is particularly true as children are developing speech/language and are constantly learning. If you have concerns about your child's hearing status, or if there are concerns about speech/language development, contact SDSD to schedule your child's comprehensive hearing evaluation, at no cost. Reduced auditory/language access can have long-term implications, both for children and adults," says Johnson.
